1-Math During the 2024-2025 school year, the percentage of students scoring proficient will increase by two percentage points from 1.98 to 3.98 as measured by the MCAP Algebra 1 assessment.	Teachers need to be equipped with effective strategies to motivate learners. These strategies include a combination of ESL/ELD approaches and close-reading techniques, which equip students with the necessary skills to read, comprehend, and tackle higher-order questions that are reflective of the MCAP tests. In particular, Algebra 1 teachers at HPHS will focus on utilizing the SOLVE strategy, with a specific emphasis on the 'O' (Organize the data), 'L' (Line up a plan), and 'V' (Verify your answer) components. This approach includes a targeted effort on sentence starters and vocabulary development within the planning phase to enhance reasoning skills in problem-solving. Previously, the focus was primarily on implementing the 'S' (Study the problem) and 'O' (Organize the data) components of the SOLVE strategy, allowing students to initially set up and understand the problems.
