




#### What did we learn?



#### Top Reported Needs From the Students' Perspective:

- Emotional support (27.6%) help with feelings of sadness, worry, anger, fear, or access to a therapist/counselor
- Clothing and shoes (17.9%)
- Food security (12.7%)
- Medical needs seeing a doctor (11.9%) and dentist/orthodontist (11.9%)
- Safety concerns help for those who don't feel safe at home (11.9%)



### Reported Needs from Families' Perspective:

- English Language Instruction (26.7%)
- Help with food Insecurity (20.6%)
- Dental/Orthodontic care (21.4%)
- Legal Services for Immigrant Families (10.7%)
- Clothing or Shoes (15.3%)



#### Reported Needs from the Community Perspective:

- Support families with legal services
- Provide supplemental food
- Help parents learn English
- Assist families with navigating the medical system



Top Reported Needs for Students and Families From the Staff Perspective::

#### Students

- Emotional health support (63.6%)
- Access to clothing/shoes (60.6%)
- Medical care from a doctor (57.6%)
- Food security (57.6%)
- Dental care (39.4%)
- Vision care (42.4%)
- Transportation to/from school (33.3%)
- After-school care (27.3%)

#### **Families**

- English language instruction (72.7%)
- Legal services for immigrant families (54.5%)
- Food security (48.5%)
- Clothing/shoes (36.4%)
- Emotional health support (33.3%)
- Internet access at home (27.3%)
- Literacy instruction (24.2%)
- Housing support for unhoused families (15.2%)

## Priorities and Opportunities

- Expand individualized and small-group interventions for reading, writing, and math.
- Continue to leverage whole-school programs, but supplement with targeted supports for struggling learners.
- Strengthen access to mental health, wellness, and basic needs services within enrichment programming.
- Maintain and expand field trips, after-school, and summer programs.

Collaborative Leadership, Shared Power, and Voice

- Increase student voice in decision-making for more authentic and structured student
  participation channels, such as student advisory councils and peer-led committees.
- Expand family leadership roles and increase participation by strengthening visibility, outreach, and invitations.
- Build leadership capacity by providing training for students, families, and staff on collaborative
  decision-making, advocacy, and facilitation to ensure diverse voices are not just present, but
  influential.
- Recruit and train new parent and student leaders by leveraging events and programs for leadership development.
- Formalize shared governance structures by creating and/or strengthening school governance teams that include students, families, and staff with decision-making authority on programming, events, and policy.

Пntegrated Systems of Support

- Expand access to counseling and emotional regulation programs.
- Increase access to resources for clothing, food, and healthcare, especially vision, dental, and medical.
- Provide workshops in English learning, literacy, parenting skills, and financial management.
- Connect immigrant families to legal aid and advocacy resources.

Culture of Belonging, Safety, and Care



- Provide staff training in trauma-informed practices and culturally responsive communication.
- Incorporate more culturally relevant lessons, books, celebrations, and guest speakers.
- Create student-led cultural events to promote belonging.
- Build on existing whole-school programs for behavior and attendance with targeted small-group and individual interventions.

Powerful Student and Family Engagement

- Develop outreach campaigns to ensure students and parents know about academic, behavioral, and wellness resources already in place.
- Incorporate more visible cultural representation in instruction, events, and school displays to ensure students feel their identities are reflected in their learning.
- Shift toward more frequent use of phone calls, texts, and in-person check-ins, while keeping email as a supplementary tool.
- Partner with local nonprofits, health clinics, and clothing banks to address clothing, food, dental, and vision needs.
- Expand English language classes for families through community-based partnerships.
