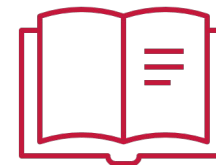

## Priorities and Opportunities

- **Harambee, Title I, and Mainstream Extended Learning Programs** provide academic support beyond the school day, with a focus on cultural responsiveness, equity, and intervention for students needing extra help or coming from low-income households.
- **Access Prep (SY 24–25)** is a new initiative aimed at preparing students for academic success through targeted readiness support.
- **TAG Program** offers enriched and accelerated instruction for high-achieving students, tailored to their strengths.
- **In-House Tutoring & Extended Support** reinforce classroom learning and help close achievement gaps, though there's a need to expand access during school breaks. Extended learning programs (Harambee, Title I, Mainstream, Access Prep) support students beyond the school day with a focus on equity and readiness. TAG enriches high-achievers, while in-house tutoring helps close gaps. Family events like STEAM and Literacy Nights build engagement. Instructional quality is strengthened through leadership teams and learning walks.

### Next Steps:

- Expand access to advanced/STEM opportunity
- Increase extended-day/year academic support
- Offer more real-world learning experiences like field trips.



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## Priorities and Opportunities

Collaborative Leadership,  
Shared Power, and Voice



Students, families, staff, and community partners actively shape school policies and programs through advisory councils, surveys, committees, and planning meetings that promote collaboration and shared decision-making.

Integrated Systems  
of Support



Students receive on-site physical, mental, and behavioral health support. Families are connected to community resources, and staff are trained to address student needs. External partners provide specialized services, and family workshops promote wellness at home.

Students, families, staff, and partners contribute to a respectful, supportive school culture. Inclusion is fostered through open communication, culturally responsive training, and peer mentorship rooted in restorative practices.

Students lead and participate in activities that build connection and pride. Families are engaged as partners through events, decision-making, and learning. Staff receive training in inclusive engagement, and partners support through workshops and family nights highlighting student leadership.
